About Our School

Our school was opened in 1939 as Marquette Junior High and was renamed in fall 1993 after the artist, Georgia O'Keeffe. Georgia O'Keeffe was born near Sun Prairie, Wisconsin on November 15, 1887, the daughter of Ida and Francis O'Keeffe, who were dairy farmers. She

studied at the Art Institute of Chicago in 1905-1906 and the Art Students League in New York in 1907-1908. She was best known for her paintings of flowers, New York skyscrapers and Western landscapes from her surroundings in New Mexico. O'Keeffe received the Wisconsin Governor's Award for Creativity in the Arts from Governor Warren Knowles in 1966 and was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1977 from President Gerald R. Ford. She died in 1986 in New Mexico. Did you know that her 1946 exhibition at New York's Museum of Modern Art (MOMA) was the first retrospective that MOMA had held for a female artist?

Mission statement

The middle school is designed for pupils who are making the transition from childhood to adolescence, from elementary to high school. This period of transition is one of emotional stresses with a wide variation among pupils in social, intellectual, and physical development. As a transitional school, the middle school is designed to meet the unique developmental needs and special interests of this age group.

Key Policies and Guidelines

Anti-bullying

O'Keeffe Middle School has a culture that promotes social, emotional and physical safety where bullying is not tolerated. We encourage our students to contribute to this culture by reporting all bullying and supporting classmates who are bullied. Students, parents or guardians are asked to make a verbal or written report of bullying to teachers, Student Services staff or Administration. Reporting forms are available in the office and can also be found on the MMSD website.

Child care/after-school information

MSCR (Madison School & Community Recreation) provides after-school recreational and enrichment opportunities for students by making available a wide variety of offerings in which a student may participate. Programs are held immediately after school and last until 4:15, when a bus departs from the school. Note: The schedule of programs may vary week to week.

Dress code

Generally, students may dress in any style they desire as long as their chosen attire does not cause a disruption or distraction in the school environment, reveal intimate body parts or pose a safety risk to the student or others. The following examples are intended to represent these limitations:.

- Students may not wear multi-fingered rings, large metal chains or other jewelry that may be used as a weapon.
- Students must wear their pants at a level that does not expose undergarments. Boxers, thong underwear and athletic shorts may not show over the waist band.
- Students may not wear clothing with vulgar or obscene statements or statements or pictures promoting illegal drugs, alcohol, sex, violence or gang activities.
- Students may not wear clothing with words, pictures or caricatures based on negative stereotypes of a specific gender, race, ethnicity, nationality, religion, sexual orientation or disability. Students may not wear shirts, hats or other attire with Native American team names, logos or mascots that depict negative stereotypes. A list of team names, logos and mascots prohibited under this provision is available at all schools and on the District website.
- Students may not wear skirts or shorts that expose undergarments or the buttocks.
- See-through clothing items are not permitted. Tops should be sufficient so as not to expose a student's bra.
- Students must wear shoes or footwear.
- Students who are dressed in a manner that does not fit within these guidelines may be asked by school staff to change their clothing or address the dress code violation. Students are expected to follow staff direction regarding dress code violations.

Electronic devices

Electronic devices must remain out of sight. Ideally, devices should remain in lockers. Devices that are seen may be confiscated. On the first infraction, the device may be confiscated and returned at the end of the day. On the second and beyond, the device may be confiscated and will require a family visit to retrieve the device.

Electronic devices include: cellular phones, iPods, MP3 players, Bluetooth speakers, Bluetooth earbuds and Airpods.

Family engagement

Parent/teacher conferences

Parent teacher conferences are held in November and February. You will have an opportunity to schedule a time to meet with your student's teachers. It is vital that parents/legal guardians and teachers are in communication with each other. At any time throughout the school year, if you have any questions about your child's progress, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher, guidance counselor or the school principal. Releasing children from school during the day

Please attempt to schedule appointments at times other than during school hours.

Help us avoid unnecessary office and classroom interruptions by sending a note to school when your child has to leave school early for an appointment. They should bring the note to the office first thing in the morning, allowing office staff to issue a pass slip. This will allow your child to leave class and the building at the designated time and means you do not need to come to the office to sign them out! However, your child should still stop by the office before leaving school so they can be checked out by office staff.

If your child has a pass to leave for an appointment and you are picking them up, please arrange beforehand where and when you will meet them. Students returning to school after an appointment need to check back in with the office. A parent does not need to accompany their child to the office when they return.

If you did not send a note to school with your child on the day they need to leave for an appointment, you will be required to come to the office to sign your child out.

Students who become ill during the day MUST be sent to the health office with a pass from a staff member. Students should not be communicating directly with a parent or guardian in case of illness without going through the health office. If the health office deems it necessary for the student to go home, they will contact the parent/guardian to come and collect their child from school. Parents/Guardians should go to the main office upon arrival to sign-out their child. Office staff will call the health office to have your child come to the office.

Reporting a child's absence from school

To report your student's absence or late arrival, please call the Attendance/Safe Arrival line at (608) 204-6821. Even if you've talked to the classroom teacher, you must still call the Attendance Line to notify the office. You must contact the school every day that your child will not be in school. You can also report absences online at mmsd.org/attendance. Planned Absence from School: If you are planning an absence of three or more school days, you will need to submit a Planned Absence request to the Principal.
